The Christmas Story Luke 2:1-20

In those days a decree went out from Emperor Augustus that all the world should be registered. This was the first registration and was taken while Quirinius was governor of Syria. All went to their own towns to be registered. Joseph also went from the town of Nazareth in Galilee to Judea, to the city of David called Bethlehem, because he was descended from the house and family of David. He went to be registered with Mary, to whom he was engaged and who was expecting a child. While they were there, the time came for her to deliver her child. And she gave birth to her firstborn son and wrapped him in bands of cloth, and laid him in a manger, because there was no place for them in the inn.

In that region there were shepherds living in the fields, keeping watch over their flock by night. Then an angel of the Lord stood before them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid; for see—I am bringing you good news of great joy for all the people: to you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign for you: you will find a child wrapped in bands of cloth and lying in a manger."

And suddenly there was with the angel a multitude of the heavenly host, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace among those whom he favors!" When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds said to one another, "Let us go now to Bethlehem and see this thing that has taken place, which the Lord has made known to us." So they went with haste and found Mary and Joseph, and the child lying in the manger. When they saw this, they made known what had been told them about this child; and all who heard it were amazed at what the shepherds told them. But Mary treasured all these words and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all they had heard and seen, as it had been told them.

The Great Thanksgiving

May God be with you.

And also with you.

Lift up your hearts.

We lift them to the Lord.

Let us give thanks to the Holy One, our God.

It is right to give God thanks and praise.

It is truly right, and good and joyful, always and everywhere to give God thanks and praise. Angels and shepherds, rejoicing in the birth of the baby Jesus, were filled to the brim with Christmas cheer, and, thousands of years later, their song still goes on. As we gather around this table, we hear faint echoes of the holy melody they sing, and, putting aside the burdens that oppress us, join with them in the song that never ends:

Holy, Holy Lord, God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory. Hosanna in the highest. Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord. Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed are you, Creator of everything. All through our lives you give us what we need: love and care, food and shelter, family and friends. We thank you for the greatest gift of all, Jesus, your Child, the Christ. He took on flesh, becoming a tiny baby, lived a human life, and taught us how to love another. He kept on giving—not for himself, but for us—until he gave up even his life so that we might be free.

On the night before he died, he shared supper with those who were most important to him. He took bread, gave it to them and said, "Take, eat. This is my Body. It is broken for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

After supper, he took the cup of wine, gave it to them and said, "Drink this, all of you. This is my Blood. It is shed for you. Do this in remembrance of me."

And now, remembering his acts of love for us—his birth and baptism, his healing and teaching, his passion and death, his resurrection and ascension—we offer to you these gifts of bread and wine, made by human hands from the gifts of nature you first gave to us. May your Holy Spirit descend upon them, that they may be for us the Body and Blood of Jesus Christ.

May your Holy Spirit descend also upon us, that we may rise from this table, inspired by your love, to live lives of generosity and service to others.

All this we ask through Jesus, the Prince of Peace, the Word made Flesh, the Child of Bethlehem, in whom all our hopes are joined. By him, and with him, and in him, in the unity of the Holy Spirit, all honor and glory be yours, Great God of all, for ever and ever. **Amen.**

The Lord's Prayer

Our Father in heaven, hallowed be your Name, your kingdom come, your will be done, on earth as in heaven. Give us today our daily bread. Forgive us our sins as we forgive those who sin against us. Save us from the time of trial, and deliver us from evil. For the kingdom, the power, and the glory are yours, now and for ever. Amen.
